Navy Order Inaugurates Campaign To Minimize All AWOL, AOL and Desertion

Attention of all hands to the new Navy policy in regard to wartime offenses involving absences and desertion, is directed today in a memorandum by Comdr. P. M. Fenton, Executive Officer.

The new procedure, automatic for the entire Navy, was published at quarters three days this week, and has been posted on all bulletin boards for immediate compliance.

Highlights of the new orders are these:

For first offenders, absence over leave less than 11 days, mast or deck court; between 11 and 30 days, summary court; over 30 days, general court.

For first offenders, absent without leave, less than one day, mast or deck court; between one and 10 days, summary court; over 10 days, general court.

For first offenders, desertion, all men absent over leave or without leave for more than 45 days will be tried for desertion.

The important order, that fully shows the Navy means business in a drive to minimize AWOL, AOL and desertion cases, continues:

"Second absence offense: (a) Offenders who for first absence offense have been punished at mast or convicted by deck court, will be tried by summary court; (b) offenders who for first absence offense have been convicted by summary court will be tried by general court unless the second offense is absence less than 48 hours, in which event the type of court will be discretionary but not less than a summary court.

"Third absence offense: Third offenders shall be tried by general court unless the absence is less than 48 hours, in which event the type of court shall be discretionary but not less than a summary court.

"None of the foregoing shall preclude the trial by general court martial of repeated absence offenders regardless of the length of absence."

CTM DeHart, With Post-war Plan, Buys \$5000 War Bond As Cash Drive Begins

Having complete faith in the stability of War Bonds and to aid the USNATB current Independence Day "Extra" cash bond campaign from 22 June to 7 July, CTM Edgar D. Dehart, USN, has purchased a \$5,000 bond, to insure a comfortable living for himself after his retirement from the Navy.

Chief Dehart, a veteran of 27 years of Naval service, has a special plan where the \$5,000 Bond, along with the \$25 bonds which he purchases each month, will give him a goodly income per month along with his regular Navy pension after his retirement from service.

A native of Ashland, Ky., the genial chief has hopes of raising chickens in a wholesale way back in his home town where his mother, father, three brothers and four sisters still reside. He has seven nephews in the Army and several cousins in the Navy. Chief Dehart entered the Navy at the tail end of World War One and has served continuously ever since having had ten years duty on submarines and the rest of the time on destroyers.

The high seas veteran was on convoy duty in the North Atlantic from 1940 through 1942 and during his many close calls on this strenuous detail was on a ship that has claimed three submarine sinkings. Before coming to USNATB, where he is stationed at the Demolition Research Unit on North Island, Dehart was a forpedoman's instructor at Newport, R. I.

Chief Dehart's plan of making purchases of War Bonds now is one of many now being thought of by the serious minded members of USNATB who know that an investment such as this is one of the finest a man can make.

The Navy's overall goal is the purchase of one extra \$100 bond per capita — both civilian and military. No specific quota has been set for this Base, but every individual will be urged to buy as many EXTRA CASH bonds as they can afford, whether it be of \$25 or \$5,000 denomination.

DEATH OF A RUMOR

Admiral Nimitz has dispatched with frankness and finality the silly but persistent rumor that the United States wants no help from the British fleet in our "private war" in the Pacific.

As "a person of some responsibility in the Pacific," to quote his own words, the Pacific Fleet's commander-in-chief has assured Britain that her help is needed and welcomed.

It is remarkable that anyone should have believed the insulting suggestion that our government or the chiefs of its armed forces would sacrifice lives and prolong the war for reasons of politics or jealousy.

But so many Americans and Englishmen did that Admiral Nimitz was forced to take cognizance of the rumor and kill it. Let us hope that no one will feel called upon to attempt any resuscitation.

GENERALS AND DIPLOMACY

General Eisenhower, speaking in behalf of the allied forces, asserted that "we are going to have peace even if we have to fight for it." He added: "All of us who are right-thinking want the common men of all nations to have the opportunities that we fought to preserve for them."

The occasion was a visit to Eisenhower's headquarters in Frankfort of Marshal Gregory K. Zhukov, who came bearing as a gift to the allied generalissimo Russia's highest decoration, the Order of Victory — a medal encrusted with rubies and diamonds. Monetary value of the decoration reportedly ran into the thousands, but it wasn't the cash value of the magnificent bauble that counted. It was the spirit of the thing — one great general presenting his country's highest award to another great general.

The fighting men of the U. S. and Russia seem to get along together all right. They know better than anybody the cost in blood and suffering of settling disputes at the points of bayonets.

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

Chaplain Adam Schutz, Jr.

In a leaflet which recently came to my desk there was the following article; which I quote in its entirety:

"When the 5th Marine Division cemetery was dedicated on bloody, windswept Iwo Jima, the sermon was delivered by the division's Jewish Chaplain, Roland B. Gittelsohn. Said he:

"Somewhere in this plot of ground there may lie the man who could have discovered the cure for cancer. Under one of these Christian crosses, or beneath a Jewish Star of David, there may rest now a man who was destined to be a great prophet. . . Now they lie here silently in this sacred soil, and we gather to consecrate this earth to their memory. . .

"Here lie officers and men, Negroes and whites, rich men and poor. . . Here are Protestants, Catholics, and Jews. . . Here no man prefers another because of his faith or despises him because of his color. Here there are no quotas of how many from each group are admitted or allowed. Theirs is the highest and purest democracy.

"Any man among us the living who . . . lifts his hand in hate against a brother, or thinks himself superior to those who happen to be in the minority, makes of this ceremony and of the bloody sacrifice it commemorates, an empty, hollow mockery."

And in good Methodist tradition I add a hearty, strong 'AMEN' to Rabbi Gittelsohn's remarkable words. This man has uttered words which show deep insight and wisdom, for regardless of what the ignorant and the hate-mongers would tell us, all men are brothers. And I mean that just as it stands — ALL men. When we condemn a man, automatically, because he belongs to a certain race, color, or creed, without regard to his personal qualifications; when we say that because he is of that race, color, or creed and is therefore not our equal and our brother, then we have lost this war to the Axis powers.

I do not care how great a military victory we may achieve, the Axis will still have won the war, for their ideology will have triumphed. And that, after all, is what they were fighting for, to impose their way of thinking upon us. Any one who believes in the superiority of his race to the point where no other race has equal rights is a traitor to Almighty God, and to our country. When we judge each man for himself, and in the light of what he himself is, and not simply on his heritage and background, we shall have triumphed over the Axis powers and

Lt. Comdr. Kenneth D. Perkins (ChC), USN, said his goodbyes at the USNATB this week and departed for duty afloat, aboard the USS Augusta, after nine months as Base Senior Chaplain.

The Lt. Comdr. Perkins, in pre-war religious life an Episcopal rector at Hilo, Ha-



waii, has been in the Navy Chaplain Corps since before Pearl Harbor, and was at Midway Island when the Japs struck on 7 December 1941.

He had three years of duty in the Pacific prior to his Stateside assignments, less than a year ago, with brief duty at Sampson Naval Station preceding the tour here.

The heavy cruiser Augusta, of the Northampton class, commissioned in 1931, has a distinguished career. Made flagship of the Atlantic Fleet in 1941, one of her historic assignments was to carry President Roosevelt to the Atlantic Charter conference. She was Rear Admiral C. F. Bryan's flagship as commander battleship support group at Normandy and Southern France landings.

Hints To The Wise To Expedite Mail Delivery

The Navy has some new postal regulations that, if closely adhered to, will expedite the speed with which the mail comes through, Lt. G. F. Beneke, Base Postal Officer, said today.

He cited two especially:

1. When personnel are transferred, change of address cards, mailed to correspondents, save much time. Postal substations on the Base have plentiful supplies of these cards, which may be obtained for the asking, or from mail orderlies.

2. New regulations no longer permit the forwarding of second class matter, such as newspapers and magazines. Addressees must see to it in the future that correct addresses are kept up to date with the publishers. The Base postoffice can no longer forward this kind of mail to personnel no longer on duty here, but merely tears off the address from the wrapper and returns to the publisher with a form letter saying future issues should be held until a new address is supplied.

Numerous personnel transfers, and curtailment of the number of men assigned to the Base postal unit makes it very necessary that all hands cooperate if best service is to be given, Lt. Beneke said.

Lt. Beneke recently succeeded Lt. Jack B. Foster as Postal Officer, coming here from 29 months of duty as postal officer, and as mail censor, at 15ND, Canal Zone.

Year Brings Changes To Beaches Of Normandy

Just a year ago, on Omaha and Utah beaches in Normandy, Allied forces made their historic invasion of Hitler's Festung Europa, with USNATB graduates in invasion boats taking assault and combat troops ashore, after other Base alumni and demolitionaries cleared the landing strips on the beaches.

Many brave hearts still sleep there on the heights beyond the beaches. Many others have received recognition and honors aplenty, and still others, just as brave, have gone unrecognized, the fortunes and ways of war being what they are.

In a year, however, the scene has changed. V-E Day has come in Europe, Gen. Eisenhower is home to receive the acclaim of the nation, and Deployment to the Pacific is the major task ahead.

Yank, the Army weekly, describes the same scene today, in an article by Sgt. Dewitt Galpin, and these quotes are his:

"Only the sun and the wind now rake the long beaches of Normandy, and kids with toy shovels play in the sands where a year ago great armies came by sea. From scarred pillboxes silent coastal guns point aimlessly down the beaches that on June 6, 1944, were covered with dead Americans. A year has passed; the beaches where the invading armies landed are quiet now."

Gilpin's article, which shows how the hotspots of the June, 1944 invasion of Normandy have become calm seaside places, is featured in the July 6th issue of YANK, on sale at Ship's Service June 29th.

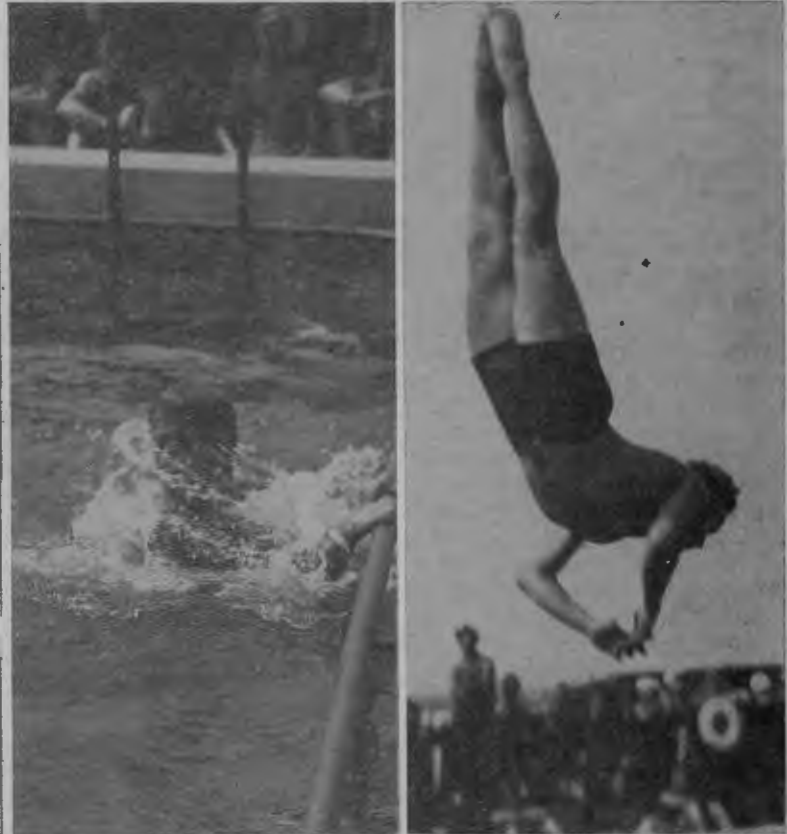
